More specifically, it will address the three following components: explanation based texts, poetry and narrative. Narrative texts studied will be novels and shorter works such as tales, children's literature and short stories.

Objectives: read, analyze and write texts of three different types: explanation-based, narrative and poetic. In so doing, a student should at the same time practice and refine his skills in oral and written French.

Effort and participation are the key to success. The language of exchange, in class especially, must be, always, “**dans la langue de Molière**”, in order to create a stimulating and learning French speaking environment.


Cultural outings

This year, the secondary 3 classes of «Français enrichi» will attend the performance of *La Société des poètes disparus*. The outing is taking place on April 16th during regular school hours at Le Théâtre Denise Pelletier. *Participation to this cultural outing is mandatory* as it is part of the academic activities required for the course.

Homework policy

+/- 20 minutes after each class

Can be: reading, studying, writing, completing written exercises, practicing oral routines, listening to specific radio or television programs, researching for projects, etc.



Grading

Term 1 and 2 are worth 20% each, term 3 is worth 60% of the total mark.
Competencies breakdown: Oral 33%, Reading 34%, Writing 33%.

December and June exams will count for 50% of each of the competencies evaluated. The exams will count for term 2 and term 3 respectively.

Class work: worksheets, dictations, reading comprehension evaluations, tests, compositions, projects, discussions, reading and media logs, etc.
