


Edmund Richard Meagher was born on January 6, 1926, the second of four boys, all of whom would attend Loyola. He grew up in western NDG, on Royal Avenue, a short tram ride from the Loyola campus that would eventually become his second home for nearly sixty years.

He entered Loyola's Junior Prep class in 1936 and from the start, he learned to balance his studies with his love of sports. Players who, in Junior Prep, made the Bantam teams. were called "Mighty Mites", a nickname well suited to the ten-year-old Ed Meagher. He made both the Bantam football and Hockey teams in his first year, launching his athletic career at his new high school.



While Ed's reputation as a Hockey player is legendary, those who saw him play football or coached him on the field said that he was even better at football than Hockey. His Hockey career took a little longer to develop as he was born without sight in his left eye. According to his two older brothers, he was also a poor skater! In his first year at Loyola, while playing goalie for the Bantam team, he had been able to disguise both of his weaknesses. However, in his second year on the Bantam team, his coach, Fr. Sherry, SJ, realized that he could do nothing about Ed's sight, so was determined to do something about his skating. For the entire first month of practices that year, Fr. Sherry took away Ed's pads and stick and made him skate around for the entire practice.



By Fourth High, as his Hockey skills continued to develop, Ed was starring for the Senior football team, a remarkable feat for a fourteen-year-old. His coaches remarked that they had never seen a player tackle so low and so accurately. The team went on to win the league championship that year and the fourteen-year-old, was named to the City All-Star team.








Following graduation from high school, Ed attended Loyola College, where he continued to excel both in academics and athletics. Unfortunately, his promising football career came to an end when, during the Second World War, the college cancelled its football program, making Hockey Ed's focus sport. In his final year at Loyola, he played on one of the finest Hockey teams the school had ever seen, a team which captured the Senior Intercollegiate Interprovincial league championship.

In those days, the Hockey season was often cut short due to Loyola Stadium's natural ice. At the end of the 1944-1945 season, Ed further developed his Hockey talents by playing junior Hockey for Mickey Hennessey's Winged Wheelers. The team won the Quebec championship that year, and Ed was named league MVP. He then signed a "C" form with the Montreal Canadiens Hockey club which, in turn, traded his rights to the Detroit Red Wings. In August 1945, when Detroit's General Manager Jack Adams invited Ed to training camp, Ed turned down the offer saying that given his lack of sight in one eye, his chances of playing in the NHL were slight. However, what had really made up his mind, was the recent offer he had received to teach and coach at Loyola.

At the age of twenty, Ed began his teaching career, eventually becoming a master in the teaching of mathematics. Thousands of future Loyola students would benefit from his mastery. He had begun his coaching career a year earlier, while still in college, when he volunteered to coach the high school's Bantam football team. That year, the team went on to win the championship, the first of twenty-five city championships that Ed would realize in his coaching career. From the beginning, his coaching philosophy was simple. Although winning was important, the effort you put into the quest was more important, and the way you did that, with dedication, sportsmanship and respect for the officials and your opponents, was most important.













In 1949, Ed left Loyola for one year, to become Athletic Director and football coach at St. Paul's College, a Jesuit school in Winnipeg. It was while he was at St. Paul's that the young coach met a pretty eighteen-year-old cheerleader named Margaret Skelly. Four years later, they married and went on to have four sons and a daughter.



While in Winnipeg, Ed realized that his heart was really at Loyola and in 1950, he returned to Montreal to become the high school's first Athletic Director. In that same decade, he was also appointed Athletic Director for Loyola College and held the dual positions for the next ten years. As Athletic Director, he realized that, in Montreal, there was a shortage of arenas that had artificial ice. There were only four, including the Forum. In 1954, in one of his major accomplishments, Ed had the Loyola Stadium converted to artificial ice ensuring that Mother Nature would no longer control the length of the Hockey season at Loyola.



Seeing the benefits of athletics in a high school student's life, Ed was determined to offer athletes who were not good enough to play on an extramural team, the chance to play sports. He was also concerned about the risks, in a teenager's life, of having to drop out of sports. In 1950, he formed a House League football program, followed by programs in basketball and Hockey.

In 1963, Ed moved into administration, when he was appointed the school's first lay Vice Principal, a post he held for the next fourteen years. While time restraints forced him to give up coaching Senior football, he continued to coach Senior Hockey, winning five more city championships and eventually his first provincial Hockey championship, in 1976.







By the mid-1970s, the political climate in Quebec was in turmoil, greatly affecting Ed's feelings for his home province and for the education system to which he had dedicated most of his life. While his love for Loyola was immeasurable, his love for his family led him to make a difficult decision. In 1976, the last person one could have imagined leaving Montreal and Loyola, left to teach and coach at St. Andrew's College in Aurora, Ontario. There, he coached the St. Andrew's Saints to league championships in three of his four years, before the lure of Loyola drew him back to Montreal. In 1980, Loyola Fr. Eric Maclean SJ, invited Ed to return to Loyola to serve as the school's first Alumni Director. One of his biggest tasks would be to raise funds for a bursary program in order to provide a Loyola education to all qualified candidates, regardless of their financial situation.

In August 1994, when Ed learned that he would be facing the toughest battle in his life, he was determined to continue the "Man for Others" character that he had demonstrated throughout his time at Loyola. Despite ill health, his enthusiasm for the school's centennial celebrations saw him take on the task of chairing the Centennial Celebration committee that organized the Centennial gala at the Windsor hotel and the Centennial mass at St. Patrick's basilica. While he died before either event was held, those in attendance could see and feel his involvement in the planning process.




















Ed's final mission on earth was the Student-Teacher Centennial Days project. It was his dream that every Loyola student would spend the week before March break participating in various activities outside the school. One of the fourteen trips and activities offered saw a group of Loyola students visit the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana. Ed loved Notre Dame for its Irish roots and its football tradition and he dreamed of one day attending Notre Dame as a student and standing in the student section of a Notre Dame football game. He realized that dream in 1991 when, at the age of sixty-five, he took a one-semester sabbatical from Loyola and enrolled in a pastoral studies program. On November 7, 1995, at the age of sixty-nine, Edmund Richard Meagher succumbed to prostate cancer. While his death caused great sadness in the Loyola community, the line-up outside the college chapel at his wake two days later, was a fitting tribute to a life well and fully lived. On Friday November 10th, Ed Meagher left the Loyola campus for the last time. His funeral was held at St. Patrick's basilica, the same church where his parents had wed and where he had served as an altar boy, some sixty years earlier. Fifteen hundred mourners, both young and old, came to bid farewell to a legend.

While Ed's legacy lives on in trophies bearing his name, his retired jersey #11, the Ed Meagher Fields and Concordia's Ed Meagher Arena, the Ed Meagher Sports Tournament is perhaps the legacy of which he would be most proud. After all, it was always the weekend Ed looked forward to the most!











The Loyola Invitational Hockey Tournament began when Loyola Senior Hockey coaches Jim Ruddy and Ed Meagher were determined to showcase the talents of high school student-athletes. When the inaugural tournament of four Senior (Juvenile) Hockey teams was reduced to only three teams due to a massive snowstorm in March 1971, those in attendance that year could never have imagined that the tournament would be still going strong fifty years later! Here is a snapshot of the tournament history.

1971

"The reigning Ontario provincial champions Michael Power High School defeated Loyola 4-3 in overtime in the final. This was the closest a Loyola Senior (Juvenile) Hockey team would come to winning its own tournament for the next twenty-five years.





1974

The now eight-team Senior (Juvenile) Hockey tournament expanded to include the sport of basketball with Loyola winning its inaugural basketball tournament.

1975

Ed Meagher knew that the newly re-named Loyola Winter Sports Tournament could only survive if a volunteer committee of parents became actively involved. A tournament committee was formed in 1975 and has been the driving force behind the success of the tournament ever since. Jack McMullan, an original member of that committee, continued to serve on the committee for the next 40 years!



1978

While Ed Meagher never won the tournament behind the bench of a Loyola team, he did coach his St. Andrews College Saints to tournament victories in 1978 and 1980. The opening ceremony of the 1978 tournament included legendary Montreal Forum anthem singer Roger Doucet.

1981

The Senior Hockey and Senior basketball tournament expanded to include a Bantam Hockey division as Potsdam High School from New York captured the inaugural Bantam championship.









1982

The following year, the basketball section also expanded with the addition of Midget basketball. College Brebeuf of Montreal won the championship that year.

1995

This was the tournament's 25th anniversary, as well as Ed Meagher's last tournament. In order to involve all three Winter sports played at Loyola, wrestling was added to the tournament with Hudson High capturing the gold medal.



1996

To honour Ed Meagher, the tournament was re-named the Loyola-Ed Meagher Sports Tournament and the first Ed Meagher Scholarship was presented at the opening ceremony. The Loyola Juvenile Hockey Warriors finally won their own tournament, only two months after Ed Meagher passed away. When the team paraded around the ice with the trophy adorned with Ed Meagher's Notre Dame ball cap, everyone in the arena could feel the spirit of Ed in the rink that night.

1998

The tournament expanded once again with the Loyola Braves winning the Bantam basketball division championship.





1999

At the Opening Ceremony this year, the first ever Loyola jersey number was retired, Ed Meagher's Hockey jersey #11.





2000

The Concordia Arena was re-named the Ed Meagher Arena at the Opening Ceremony of this year's tournament. It was only fitting that the arena was named for the man who spent 55 years of his life on the Loyola campus, including a ten-year dual role as Athletic Director for both the High School and College.






2003

The tournament expanded to a seven-division tournament when M13 Hockey was added this year. The Loyola Scouts captured the gold medal.

2007

In recognition of Bob Shaughnessy's 50 years at Loyola as a student, athlete, teacher, coach, Athletic Director and Alumni Director, the championship trophy for the M13 division was named in his honour.





2008


Following the sudden death of Loyola's President Fr. Eric Maclean, SJ in 2007, the tournament committee paid tribute to Loyola's beloved president by naming the Juvenile Championship trophy in his honour.





2010

At the Opening Ceremony of the 40th tournament, past Honorary Chairpersons, Ed Meagher Scholarship winners and an Honorary Captain from the inaugural year for each tournament division were honoured. The Midget basketball championship trophy was named in honour of former Loyola basketball coach Fr. Gerry Mathieu, SJ.

2012

After fifteen consecutive championships by wrestling powerhouse Kahnawake Survival School, Loyola finally won the wrestling division of the tournament. This would be the first of six championships Loyola Wrestling teams would capture over the next eight years.

2015

Described as the most all-round athlete in the history of Loyola High School and Loyola College, the Bantam Hockey championship trophy was named in honour of Jack McMullan. Jack was an original member of the Sports Tournament Committee, serving as a volunteer longer than anyone else - a remarkable 40 years!





2020

Loyola is celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Loyola-Ed Meagher Sports Tournament. It is a remarkable milestone that everyone in the Loyola community, both past and present, can be extremely proud. Congratulations Loyola!




Past Honorary Chairpersons









Michael Elie is a graduate of the class of 1997. He played bantam hockey in Secondary 3 and Juvenile hockey in Secondary 4 and 5. As a member of the Warriors he was able to visit the famous University of Notre Dame on Loyola's Centenary trip (inspired by Ed Meagher) in Secondary 4 and then was on the first Loyola team to win the Loyola Tournament against St. Thomas in 1996. In Secondary 5 he was once again in the tournament final, this time losing in double overtime. He has been teaching at Loyola since 2003 and has been a member of the Ed Meagher Sports Tournament Committee since then as well. Over the past 20 years he has coached tennis, juvenile soccer and several hockey teams, starting with the PeeWee program alongside Jarrett Ketterling (his former coach and teacher) before moving onto the Juvenile program alongside Phil Lafave. As an assistant coach with Phil, he co-led several European hockey trips and ultimately

won several city championships, most recently in 2016 with the Warriors. More recently, he took on the head coach role of the Division 2 juvenile squad, winning the championship in 2019 before stepping down from coaching due to Covid and family obligations. He continues to be involved in the Ed Meagher sports tournament by managing the incredible student volunteers who scorekeep, DJ and sell raffle tickets at both the arena and gyms.





M13 Hockey Rules



- 1. Sweater Colors: Visitors in White, Home in Dark.
- **2. Rules:** RSEQ rules apply. Please note, as per the schedule, attached the length of each game. No games can end in a tie. The OT format is 3 vs 3, except for Gold Medal games that will be 4 vs 4 for 5 minutes followed by 3 vs 3 until the first goal is scored.
- 3. Player Eligibility: Strict adherence to RSEQ league rules will apply re: player eligibility.

 Participating players must be regular members of their respective school team. Players may NOT play on more than one school team during the tournament All league suspensions carry over to the tournament.
- 4. Running Time: If there is a 5 goal differential after the second period, the game will be running time for the duration of the game. If the score is tied after regulation, the teams will play 3 minutes of 3 vs 3 OT, followed by a sudden death shootout. All championship games will be decided by a 3 vs 3 OT. Tie breaker format for M13 and M15: 1) Fewest goals against in all games; 2) Best goal differential in all games (goals scored minus goals against); 3) Most goals scored in all games ... if still tied, we will have a coin toss.
- **5.** Each team is allowed 1 time-out per game.
