Cette rénovation a été menée par un diplômé de Loyola, profondément lié à notre école, et soutenue par une équipe d'anciens élèves. Leur engagement incarne l'esprit de la communauté de Loyola, où notre passé est intimement lié à notre présent et, par conséquent, à notre avenir. Ce projet nous rappelle que tout est possible lorsque la communauté de Loyola se rassemble autour d'un but commun.

#### **Process for the Submission of Nominations**

- The nominator should explain how the nominee meets the criteria for consideration to the Hall of Merit, highlighting the nominee's substantial contributions to society in the spirit of 'service for others'.
- The nominator should provide examples of how the nominee embodies the "5 Characteristics of the Loyola Grad at Grad" of being open to growth, spiritual, intellectually competent, loving, and committed to doing justice.
- The nominator is responsible for contacting three individuals willing to submit letters in support of the nomination.
- The nomination letter and the three letters of support should not exceed two pages in length and should adhere to the criteria mentioned above.

#### The deadline for submitting nominations for candidates along with three letters of support is Thursday, January 25, 2024.

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

# 50 years since Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ's seminal address

It was 50 years ago when Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ, the then Superior General of the Society of Jesus, delivered his historic speech at the International Congress of Jesuit Alumni of Europe in Valencia, Spain. It was a fitting occasion, as this speech was given on the feast day of St. Ignatius of Loyola.

Fr. Arrupe's famous 1973 discourse, originally titled *Men for Others*, is now recognized as *Persons for Others*, to embrace more inclusive language. It has since encapsulated the essence of what alumni of Jesuit schools worldwide aspire to be and has significantly influenced the direction and principles of Jesuit education.

Fr. Arrupe's words continue to challenge and inspire us: "Today our prime educational objective must be to form men and women for others; men and women who will live not for themselves but for God and his Christ." As we commemorate the 50th anniversary, his call for Jesuit education embodies a spirit of solidarity and an education focused on justice, shaping individuals into advocates for and with others.



#### A Life Devoted to Faith, Justice and Service: Remembering Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ (1907-1991)

Fr. Arrupe, SJ was born in the Basque region of Spain in 1907. After some years of medical training, Fr. Arrupe entered the Jesuits in 1927. After being ordained, Fr. Arrupe was sent to Japan in 1938. His early years as a missionary in Japan exposed him to the harsh realities of the world, culminating in his survival of the Hiroshima atomic bombing. This profound experience fueled Fr. Arrupe's lifelong commitment to service. He was a Jesuit priest who left an enduring legacy. He was elected in 1965 as the 28th Superior General of the Society of Jesus and held the position until 1983. Fr. Arrupe steered the Jesuit order through a transformative era. Emphasizing a men and women for others approach, he urged Jesuits to actively engage in societal issues. He played a crucial role in shaping the Jesuit response to global challenges, advocating for the marginalized. His life reflects a remarkable integration of faith and justice, leaving an indelible mark on the Jesuit order's identity and mission.

# Reaching for the Stars Dr. Peter Lee '89, a lifelong learner

Loyola High School's efforts to care for the whole person (*cura personalis*) often bear fruit only years after our students graduate from the school. This particular mission of Jesuit education is for students to develop many interests and skills and to see themselves as people with diverse interests and passions. The school's hope is that graduates will "reach for the stars" – a notion alumnus Dr. Peter H.U. Lee '89 took to heart.

Born in Germany to a Korean family, Dr. Lee MD '05 'PhD '15, grew up in Montreal's Snowdon neighbourhood. While attending Loyola High School was a natural choice due to his Catholic upbringing, it also played a pivotal role in providing him with a solid foundation for building his stellar career.

Dr. Lee's passion for space exploration led him to apply to two prestigious American preparatory schools, Phillips Exeter Academy and Phillips Academy (Andover), both of which admitted him. Remarkably, in the same year, three other Loyola High School students were also accepted to Andover. Choosing Andover, alongside two fellow Loyola students, laid the groundwork for remarkable growth opportunities.

Dr. Lee's academic journey continued with his acceptance into the distinctive Program in Liberal Medical Education (PLME) at Brown University in Rhode Island, which merged an undergraduate education with guaranteed admission into its medical school. He went on to earn a bachelor's degree in Neuroscience, a medical degree, and a doctorate in Pathobiology at Brown.

Before embarking on his medical studies, he spent a transformative year in France, where he earned a Master's degree in Space Studies from the International Space University. Upon his return to Brown, he achieved the rare honor of having an experiment selected for John Glenn's space shuttle mission in 1998 studying the effects of spaceflight on genetically modified tissue-engineered skeletal muscle.

Dr. Lee's commitment to being a lifelong learner has never waned. Fueled by his early fascination with surgery during medical school, Dr. Lee embarked on an extensive educational journey. He pursued a Master of Public Health at Harvard University and furthered his learning through general surgery training at Tufts University, a cardiothoracic surgery fellowship at the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA), and a year at Stanford University focusing on heart and lung transplantation.

At the age of 41, Dr. Lee began his first job at The Ohio State University (OSU), where he performed heart and lung transplants while simultaneously managing his own lab, funded by The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and the National Institutes of Health (NIH). In addition to research and surgery, Lee also served many national leadership roles, including on the Executive Council of the Aerospace Medical Association and the Governing Board of the American Society for Gravitational and Space Research. His contributions extended to conducting four experiments that were sent to the International Space Station. Dr. Lee also served as the medical officer for a one-month Mars simulation mission on Devon Island in the Canadian arctic and he was a finalist for the Canadian astronaut program in 2016.

His skill set goes beyond the realms of medicine and aerospace research. In 2014 he joined the U.S. Air National Guard where he is a Lieutenant Colonel and serves as a general surgeon as part of a Ground Surgical Team and a flight surgeon. Dr. Lee is also an Aviation Medical Examiner and special consultant for the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

Dr. Lee embodies Loyola's core principle of *cura personalis* through his lifelong commitment to learning and exploration. Over two decades ago, he obtained a 7th degree grandmaster rank in Taekwondo, a private pilot's license, and added a Master SCUBA diver certification to his ever-growing list of accomplishments. For Dr. Lee, acquiring new skills has always been

"a way to learn more about yourself and allows you to try to push your boundaries". He emphasizes the importance of "continuous medical education, acknowledging that staying updated with current knowledge and techniques is essential for providing the best care to patients."

Reflecting on his career, Dr. Lee deeply embraced Loyola's motto of forming "men and women for others". As an educator and mentor, he leveraged the values instilled at Loyola to better serve others and contribute to their well-being. He found fulfillment in guiding students towards achieving their dreams and took pride in their achievements, often stating, "It's a proud moment when they do even better than you." This materialized when one of his mentees, Jessica Meir, paid tribute to his mentorship when she became a NASA astronaut.

Dr. Lee has received numerous awards, but the one that holds the most significance for him is the Early Achievement Award presented by the Brown Medical School Alumni Association. This accolade acknowledges exceptional contributions made by a medical alumnus during the early stages of their career. He is also a Knight in two prestigious royal orders, being a Grand Cross Knight in the Royal Equestrian and Military Order of Saint Michael of the Wing, a Portuguese Roman Catholic dynastic order, and a Knight Commander in the Order of Prince Danilo I.

As Dr. Lee stands at the forefront of medical advancements and aerospace exploration, he reminds us that the pursuit of knowledge knows no bounds. He has always followed his heart in exploring his diverse interests, no matter how far-reaching they may seem, and this has helped shape him as a prominent leader in the fields of medicine, space and aviation. He hopes to venture into space someday - a feat that is well within his reach.



He shared insights into his role in training astronauts for both the Canadian Space Agency and NASA. Our students gained valuable knowledge about the future of the International Space Station and the upcoming lunar mission.

Brian Ewenson is an Aerospace Educator, Consultant and Professional Speaker, on Aviation and Aerospace. Brian has worked for the Canadian Space Agency, Lockheed Martin's Space Day and Challenger Learning Centers. He has designed, developed and flown student and corporate experiments on the Space Shuttle and International Space Station and subsequently trained astronauts to do his work in space.

Brian has attended and/or presented at 27 of the 28 ISSEC and SEEC conferences at Space Center Houston and was the recipient of the 2010 Cherri Brinley Aerospace Educator of the Year Award.









# CarbiCrete Paving the way in the fight against climate change

Chris Stern '88 and Yuri Mytko '93 stand at the forefront of the cleantech movement, spearheading innovative solutions with a resolute commitment to forging a more sustainable world.

In a world grappling with environmental challenges, CarbiCrete, a Quebec-based sustainable company, has become a prominent figure in the sustainability arena. Their pioneering approach to mitigating carbon emissions within the concrete industry has earned them widespread recognition.

#### The Concrete Carbon Conundrum

Concrete, the planet's second most consumed substance following water, presents a pressing environmental dilemma. Its production hinges heavily on cement, a major contributor to the alarming 8% of global greenhouse gas emissions. CarbiCrete, however, is leading the charge with an ingenious technological solution by replacing cement in the concrete mix with steel slag, a by-product of the steelmaking process. This groundbreaking substitution effectively eliminates the emissions tied to cement production, making their process carbon neutral. Beyond this, CarbiCrete employs waste carbon dioxide for curing products like construction blocks. This transformative step converts the entire process into a carbon-negative endeavour by permanently removing CO2 from the atmosphere, thus contributing to a more sustainable planet.

#### **Overcoming Entrepreneurial Hurdles**

Chris and Yuri (pictured below) acknowledge the arduous journey of building a business from the ground up. They had to surmount an initial hurdle in educating the concrete industry about the profound environmental impact of cement. Additionally, managing the expectations of diverse stakeholders, including employees, investors, customers, and board members, is no small feat. Transparency, consistent communication, and an unwavering commitment to their objectives have proven to be the pillars of their success.

#### Chris Stern '88

Chris studied mechanical engineering McGill University. at He then embarked on a career in sales and business development, notably in pharmaceutical packaging equipment and automotive machining. He co-founded Pure Energies, which empowered homeowners to adopt solar energy and home conservation products, eventually selling it to NRG Energy in 2014. His path shifted when he met Mehrdad Mahoutian, who had pioneered a process for manufacturing low carbon concrete using waste streams. This encounter led Chris to venture back into the startup world, where he assumed the role of CEO and co-founder at CarbiCrete, driven by a mission to bring this technology to market.

#### Loyola: The Bedrock of Entrepreneurship

Their formative years at Loyola have left an indelible mark on Yuri and Chris. The enduring relationships and the supportive and nurturing rapport between students and teachers, a unique hallmark of the Loyola experience, have profoundly influenced their journeys. "My closest friends are those that I made at Loyola, my business partner is a Loyola grad, and my wife went to a Loyola sister-school" shares Yuri. For Chris, some of his most cherished memories are linked to the football field, and his history teacher, Mr. John Javornik who jokingly said "Stern, you come from a long line of smart people...what happened?"

#### Advice for Aspiring Entrepreneurs

Chris emphasizes the importance of networking and learning from seasoned founders. Actively participating in pitching contests and seeking guidance from those who have walked the entrepreneurial path are invaluable steps in the journey towards building a successful enterprise.

#### Paving the Way for a Greener Tomorrow

CarbiCrete's technology tackles greenhouse gas emissions headon, offering a path to eliminate the need for cement in concrete. Their innovation solves three critical challenges: reducing waste, curbing emissions, and removing CO2. This positions CarbiCrete as a force in the ongoing battle to decarbonize demanding industries such as steel and concrete.





#### The Foundation of their Passions

Chris finds joy in spending time with his children, and his passion is grounded in the pursuit of solving the climate crisis through technology, securing a brighter future for the next generation. Yuri's passion is rooted in his love for music, family, and sports – all of which he cultivated during his time at Loyola.

#### Champions of Men and Women for Others

The principle of *men and women for others* resonates with Yuri and Chris. It underscores the importance of recognizing one's role within a broader community, understanding the impact of one's actions on that community, and acknowledging the moral responsibility to act for the greater good. Through their impactful work at CarbiCrete, Yuri and Chris embody the values instilled in them at Loyola, contributing to a better and more sustainable future for all.

#### Fostering Business Acumen with the Student Stock Exchange

For their final project in Financial Education, our Secondary 5 students created a total of nineteen companies and successfully sold their wares during the two selling days at the end of April.

They built their own kiosks, developed their business plans, designed their logos, marketed their products, and even sold shares. With the generous support of the Loyola community, the students raised over \$20,000 for various charities. The title of Loyola's Entrepreneur of the Year for the 2023 SSX was awarded to Twisted Taters who selected Plast Montreal Пласт Монтреаль, the Ukrainian youth organisation of Quebec as their beneficiary charity.

This initiative exemplifies the value-added aspect of a Loyola education - a practical, hands-on learning experience that involves the entire school and benefits the broader community.



#### Yuri Mytko '93

Yuri studied liberal arts at Dawson and philosophy at McGill University. He explored law school but soon realized it was not his true calling. After gaining valuable experience in the telecommunications industry in New York and London, he returned to academia. He pursued an MBA with a focus in Marketing, Communications and Media Management at Fordham University.

Upon his return to Montreal, he held roles as a fundraiser at Loyola High School and as a marketing and communications professional across diverse sectors including philanthropy, higher education, healthcare, and venture capital. Fascinated by CarbiCrete's technology, Yuri joined forces with Chris, where he now serves as Chief Marketing Officer.

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

# Lisa Dias Memorial Fund






# Alumni Giving by Decade

# **Principal's Corner**

I'm fairly sure that, from the end of August until the end of June, Loyola High School never sleeps. The school is in a constant state of positive and productive activity. However, as we embrace the 2023-2024 school year, it is vital that we take into account three 'r' words: reflection and reacquaintance, in the greater hope of renewal.

British writer Thomas Carlyle wrote the following: "To each is given a certain Talent, a certain Outward Environment of Fortune; to each, by wisest combination of these two, a certain maximum of Capability." This fine quotation captures the essence of the formation of the whole person we instill in our students at Loyola.

Carlyle first addresses the inherent possibility contained within each individual. He is suggesting that every person is given particular abilities. The bold ultimatum of any new school year is to identify, reflect upon, and embrace these strengths.

The second part of the quotation about the "Outward Environment of Fortune" looks external, to an individual's surroundings and the opportunity afforded, with able assistance, to become reacquainted with a school that offers the perfect conditions, should one take advantage of all its amenities, to achieve success.

Finally, the passage ends by suggesting it is through a potent mix of the internal and external, talent and environment, that our students can reach their "maximum of Capability." This requires consistent renewal and meeting the challenge of the Jesuit term *magis*, which means not more, as in quantity, but better, as in quality.

They explored the charming town of Stratford and enjoyed captivating performances, including "Rent" at the Festival Theatre, "Grand Magic" at the Tom Patterson Theatre, and "Spamalot" at the Avon Theatre.

# Meet Louis Félix Valiquette

### Campus Minister

The Loyola Family is happy to welcome Louis Félix Valiquette as the school's new full time Campus Minister in 2023-2024. Mr. Valiquette's boundless energy and enthusiasm will no doubt inspire the students he is shepherding in individual grade level spiritual formation teams. In addition, he will be ably coordinating a number of important dossiers, including Retreats and Kairos, Experience Week and the Christian Service Program (CSP).

#### What is your background and experience?

I'm originally from Montérégie, and I've spent my entire educational journey within the public school system. I took an international program in high school before venturing out to settle in Lac-Saint-Jean for three years. Later, I continued my studies at the University of Sherbrooke, initially focusing on environmental studies and then transitioning to theology. My career path led me to work with various community organizations, particularly those involved in immigrant integration and supporting marginalized populations. I also had the privilege of managing the youth mission of the Saint-Jean-Longueuil Diocese and working with the Phare de Longueuil organization. One of the highlights was coordinating World Youth Day with a delegation in Portugal.

#### How would you define Campus Ministry to today's youth?

To help young people grasp what Campus Ministry is all about, I invite them to think of it as "Campus Caring" or, more broadly, "Caring for the Campus". From my perspective, the primary mission of Campus Ministry is to care for the school community, including students, teachers, parents and others. It's a welcoming space, always centered on Christ's unconditional love, offered to all to help them develop their abilities, deepen their faith, experience new horizons and come together as a community.

#### What are the goals of the Christian Service Program (CSP) for this year?

While Campus Ministry focuses on caring for the Loyola community, the Christian Service Program provides students with opportunities to think beyond their immediate surroundings and engage in acts of evangelical justice. Following Jesus' example, they extend their service to people in need. Through this program, we aim to encourage students to open their hearts and minds to the pressing social issues that persist in our society. The objective is not merely to raise awareness about these challenges but also to prepare our students to become effective agents of change in their communities.

#### What inspired you to take on your current role at Loyola?

I believe it was a calling from God that led me to this role. Following a series of life decisions, I went to Villa Saint-Martin on a whim, contemplating my professional future. I met many young men at the retirement home, sharing their profound stories of faith. It was there that I learned of the existence of a Jesuit, Catholic school in Montreal. In a conversation with Fr. Altilia, SJ, I discovered that a campus ministry position was available, and the rest, as they say, is history.

#### What are your hopes for the future of the CSP program?

This year, as our entire Campus Ministry team is new, our focus is on effective continuity with the projects and initiatives of our predecessors. We aim to ensure that the CSP and other Campus Ministry activities align with the Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAPs) and empower students to develop their abilities to become *men and women for others*. Our hope is to build on the foundation laid by previous programs, adapting them to better reflect these preferences and provide a platform for students to grow and serve their communities.



# Game-Changing: 1st Co-ed Athletics Season







James (Jim) Pearson 1932-2023

Mr. James (Jim) Pearson '49 began his teaching career at Loyola in 1956, becoming an integral part of the Math Department. In 1980, alongside colleague Ed Meagher, he initiated the Loyola High School Foundation. By 1990, both Jim and his wife Joan were inducted into the Loyola Hall of Merit.

Although he retired from teaching in 1996, Mr. Pearson's commitment to the school remained unwavering through his continued dedication to the Foundation. Notably, he holds the distinction of being the longestserving educator in Loyola's history.

With his profound understanding of Loyola, in 2018, Mr. Pearson authored "Loyola Montreal: Stories From our History." This comprehensive 300-page book provides a unique perspective on the 120-year history of Loyola High School and Loyola College. It stands as the most extensive compilation of narratives from the Montreal Loyola community, serving as a testament to Jim's remarkable 70-year association with the school.



### **Eulogy for my buddy**

Excerpts from eulogy written by Robert (Bob) Shaughnessy '61

I started teaching at Loyola in the fall of 1966. I was assigned to the Math Department where there was a formidable array of mentors including Jim Pearson, or Pearse as he was affectionately referred to. Mathematical concepts can be a tad confusing at times, but Jim had the ability to explain the complicated in a clear and concise manner. He had a love of Math, and he quietly passed it on to the rest of us. A few years later, Pearse and I were conscripted to figure out "scheduling". You get to know someone well when you are trying to put a square plug-in a round hole. Pearse was always calm as could be and would always come up with a "Pearson algorithm" to save the day.

We coached the Bantam hockey team together a few years. One year, the Bantam and Senior team (coached by Jim Ruddy and Ed Meagher) were both playing in the City Finals at Loyola's rink. We won our game and the whole team stayed and watched the Seniors win their game. After the kids had gone, the four of us stayed in the room and went over the season and talked about the kids - I can still remember how excited Jim was talking about the boys. that was his strong point as a teacher. There's the time Pearson's back was bothering him, and he was continually stretching it - it was not unusual for him to lay on the desk for a bit while teaching. Eric Cook and some of his classmates recall this vividly but this style of teaching never bothered them. Indeed, to a man they all said, "We loved the guy - we also realized he was "on our side" as young men, regardless of what we did as students. We sensed a genuine kindness from him, which we gravitated to. We knew we could trust him. In our books, he was a "good guy".

What a gift he had.

He loved to tell jokes and he always pushed up his glasses right before the punch line, followed by that mischievous smile and quiet laugh. At faculty meetings, when debates came close to arguments, he was the voice of reason and thoughtful diplomacy. I always thought of him as the quintessential gentleman, embracing old school manners and dignity. He did it all at Loyola and in the process won the hearts of his peers, the students he taught and the staff he worked with. Jim, may you rest in peace and God bless.

# Remembering Padre

Excerpts from Memorial Service speech written by Eric Vani '91


Years ago, I was blessed to share a quiet moment with a wise ol' man - we ruminated over the purpose of life and death. Indeed, a profound and intimidating topic. Ask any graduate or person who knew him well and they will say that his non-judgemental and sincere approach made him the go-to person to speak with about any topic from the existence of God to the harsh vicissitudes of teenage relationships. to the best football team in NFL history - nothing was off the table with him. He listened attentively, never used platitudes, and always ended discussions with, "I will pray for you."

Padre wore many hats at Loyola, serving as president, administrator, teacher, chaplain, coach and, most importantly, companion. He dedicated himself to his students and ensured that he journeyed with each of them. He was a master teacher, who was more interested in the development of the whole person – he taught the individual first, then the subject. His lessons were all founded on love – love for his students, love for the topics he shared, and love for life-long learning.

Beyond the hallowed halls of Loyola, Fr. Brennan shared his goodness with the world. He rarely declined requests to officiate weddings or baptisms for former students, regardless of how hectic his schedule was or how treacherous the travel would be to get to his destination - he always presided with an energetic smile and a willingness to serve.

And serve he did - most notably, alongside Saint Mother Teresa, tending to Calcutta's most marginalized community. Fr. Brennan dutifully served men, women and children who suffered from leprosy. In 2011, Padre spent his March Break tending to the needs of citizens in Fukushima, Japan, after giant waves flooded nuclear reactors in the area, forcing over a hundred thousand people to flee from the radiation. Indeed, another reminder of Padre's desire to care for others by giving and not counting the costs.

Thank you for being such an influential part of my life, as well as the lives of countless others. His words - will forever echo in our minds: "Caring and compassion can hurt. [...] But when you demonstrate care and compassion, not only are you doing something special, you're becoming something special."



### Fr. Robert (Rob) Brennan, SJ 1945-2023

It is not hyperbole to state that Fr. Brennan was the peaceful heart of Loyola High School during these last few years of disruptions and uncertainty. With a dutiful elegance, he took on the role of Interim President at the outbreak of the pandemic, his second time as spiritual leader of our community, before returning to his long-time post of school chaplain, a post he has occupied almost constantly since his arrival in 1986.

Many of you have been blessed to know Fr. Brennan as a student, an alumnus, a parent, a colleague and a friend. During any given month, it was unsurprising to find an old student make the pilgrimage to the High School in order to chat with him. Countless are the weddings, baptisms and funerals over which he presided in our community. Countless are the words of wisdom he has imparted in times of joy, sorrow and all moments in between.

Fr. Brennan, SJ, helped us "see God in all things", and we in turn knew God better by virtue of being in his presence.
