

## PRESIDENT'S CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

## The Cross on the Manger

t's interesting that in old manger scenes depicting Christmas one can often find a cross on top of the stable. I remember noticing this phenomenon when I was young and thinking that it was like discovering a watch on the wrist of an actor depicting a scene from a time before watches were invented – it was a mistake, an anachronism – obviously the cross would not have had any meaning at the time of Jesus' birth because Easter hadn't happened yet.

As I grow older, I more and more realize how significant that cross on the manger really is. It seems that almost every November when I sit to write the Christmas message, my heart and mind end up being preoccupied with some difficult situation in my own family or in our Loyola community. It's difficult to think about presents, sleigh rides and tinsel in the midst of the challenges of our lives. One of the difficulties we can have with the celebration of Christmas occurs when we think about it as the celebration of a utopic dream world. It's a dream world that none of us seems able to attain, but we can pretend to have found it one day every year. Inevitably, this idea of Christmas leads to disappointment and even resentment.

Growing up, my family had two "professional" aunts, Mary and Margaret, who never married and so were much more a part of our family. It was like having extra grandparents to spoil and look after you. My aunt Margaret died a few years ago during the Christmas season - her favourite holiday! I remember going to the hospital room to be with her on Christmas day and hearing stories from the nurses and patients about the wonderful lady that brightened the whole floor with her presence, but feeling horrible that she would be spending Christmas in the hospital. It so happened that on the floor right below hers, in the room that was directly beneath hers, another family, the Cloutier-Beland family, was also spending Christmas day in the hospital. But this family was celebrating the birth of their first-born son, Matthew (who, incidentally, will be attending Loyola next Fall). My brother Sean and I went down to visit this new little arrival, and we were both struck by how the scene in one room seemed to be the alter idem, different but same, of the other. It really was the cross on the manger.



It's true that the cross is out of place on the manger if the cross marks the tragic end of that new life we are celebrating. But the cross is actually the hope-filled triumph of that life over the suffering and death that makes up a part of all of our lives. Christmas Joy does not stem from the wishful desire of a life without suffering, but from the confident hope that this infant's life means that all of our suffering can have meaning and even bring joy.

Our community has had its share of suffering over the last little while. Mr. Ryan's plight has touched us with sadness and sympathy but has also moved us to an outpouring of love, hope and support. Sean's work, his faith, his worldview and his respect and love for others inspire the joy that is at the heart of the Christmas message. God's Grace and His overwhelming love expressed so perfectly in the infant child of Bethlehem and reflected so beautifully in the lives of people like Sean, mean that our greatest fears can be transformed into joy and hope.

May that Joy and Hope be with us all this Christmas.

## The Loyola Archives "The Way We Were"

## Boxing at Loyola: 1920 - 1934, the Early Years

(First of a three-part series)

Alumnus Ian Thomson '66 presented the Loyola Archives with this wonderful history of the evolution of amateur boxing at Loyola. Ian's interest in Loyola's boxing history germinated from a family story recounted to him on several occasions throughout his youth. It didn't mean particularly much to him back then, but when he met-up with his cousin Robert after 60 years apart, there was a moment when they both landed on the same cobweb-wrapped memory. Robert's father (Malcolm) had been an amateur boxer in his youth. With this little tease, Ian set out to document the more factual details of the story.

In drawing on the annual Loyola College Review (hereafter referred to as Yearbooks) for this purpose, it is noteworthy that ne'er a mention of boxing is made in the earlier editions running from 1915-19 inclusive. In the 1920 edition, there is a reference to the creation of The Intermediate Club as "a response to students' lamentations that 'There's no place to go'" and "The Seniors have everything." This first Yearbook report on the sport notes that "...most enjoyable evenings were spent [at the Intermediate Club] especially during the long winter months...[when] there were contests in boxing [etc.]." At the time, A. Fregeau was recognised as a boxing hero in this respect (page 85). It was similarly reported that the already established Smokers' Club, which was presumably made up of more senior students, likewise engaged in some in-house fisticuffs as well.

The years 1921 and 1922 provided only the very thinnest smatterings of indirect references to boxing, but in 1923 there is an observation that "In class, Bobie [which should more correctly read as Bobbie Munich] spars as truly and strongly as when in the boxing ring, battling for the Junior City Lightweight Title." This minimal reference does at the very least suggest that there were boxers at Loyola that took part in some off-campus competitive

events and championships. Presumably for a number of these students, it could be assumed that their event preparations, instruction and skills development might have been conducted largely off-campus at clubs like the YMCA, MAAA, and their equivalents around the Island.

[...]Sergeant-Major Thomas Leo Murtagh arrives on campus in 1921, identified as the Assistant Physical Fitness instructor. He had been a professional boxer before his enlistment for WWI service, and he would become a ubiquitous presence and key supporter of a respected but somewhat low-key campus boxing program for many years to come. The descriptor "low key" is applied here only to reflect that the campus boxing fraternity appears to have been mostly rooted in Loyola's Canadian Officers' Training Corps (COTC) and Cadet Corps rather than the student body more generally, at least in these early years.

In 1924, Yearbook mention is made of a Francis Villela as having "...formerly held the welterweight boxing championship(s) of the College" (page 35). Unfortunately, there is no elaboration as to the original inaugural date or frequency of said "championships". However, this edition of the Yearbook sees a first complete summary note on boxing presented within the "Athletics"

section's roundup of the year's achievements in team and individual sports (page 135). Admittedly, it is a brief article scribed by Kenneth McArdle '27. Its most significant insight is the apparent intention "...to hold a College Boxing Tournament at some date in the near future." By deduction, this suggests confirmation that Loyola's pugilistic events of this kind had been rather few-and-far between.

The year 1925 offers no Yearbook mention of the sport, but in 1926 Ken McArdle '27 offers another brief report. "Loyola has not seen a greater interest in the manly art of self-defence nor better exhibitions since the first historic tournament held on campus in 1911" (page 104). Here, McCardle is referring to three exhibition events that were staged in the College Hall for the benefit of the Sodality Scholarship Fund. Aside from the mention of this year's (1925) events, it also offers clear

evidence that we can push the roots of Loyola campus boxing at least as far back as 1911.

The annual Yearbook "Athletics" overview section for 1927 editorialises that "Due notice must also be taken of Boxing, which once more occupied its position among the more important

sports of the College" (page 74). Perhaps the only possible comment that might be offered here is one of pitying the status of those other sports not being covered in the Yearbook, given how very thinly its editors treated boxing. Nevertheless, for a first time ever... there is a boxing team photo.

Then, as quickly as the sport appears to gain a degree of recognition, there follows five years (1928-33) of essentially no Yearbook mentions of or visibility for the young practitioners.

In the 1934 Yearbook's "Athletics" report, the LCAA noted that basketball and boxing made a comeback. In fact, there was an additional comprehensive summary included for "Boxing" in this section. This was a first in terms of its length and prominence. It reported in detail on the College Tournament that was held on May 12. Included were invited representatives from Regiopolis (Kingston) and overall the event was lauded as a great success

(pages 65-66). The Yearbook also included a photo of most of the victors with their trophies ... The evident success of this modest undertaking suggests that what we have here is perhaps one of the root origins of the eventual "Kid Gloves" tourneys that would eventually launch in 1938.

Ian Thomson graduated from Loyola High School in 1966, and from the College [BCom. Hon. Economics] in 1970. He pursued post-graduate studies at Queen's University (Economics) and earned an MA [Economics] from Simon Fraser University (1972).

He joined the federal Public Service with Fisheries and Oceans Canada in 1973, where he held a variety of positions over his ten-year stint. In 1982, Ian joined Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada. Later, he held various international trade policy and market development positions, most notably with respect to Canada's agriculture, food and beverage trade with the U.S. and EU. After 36 years of a career focussed on improving the economic wellbeing of Canada's fisheries, agriculture and food sectors, he retired from the Public Service in 2009.
