

### Loyola to Launch On-Line Archive



#### This spring 2014 Loyola High School will launch its On-line Archive.

Loyola High School has a rich historical and visual Archive dating back to its beginnings in 1848 at Collège St. Marie. Preparations have been ongoing over the last year to bring this On-line Archive to all who wish to explore Loyola High School's historical and educational connection to the city of Montreal and to the English Speaking Catholic Community.

The On-line Archive will begin with an exploration of several collections including **Loyola's Beginnings** starting in 1848,



**Jesuits at Loyola** and **Hockey at Loyola: 1893 to 1950**. The On-line Archive will continue to expand as more and more collections are uploaded to the site. As there are thousands of photos and text to prepare, the Archive is a work-in-progress.

### Unveiling of Renovated Ed Meagher Arena

From 1951-60 Ed served a ten-year dual role as Athletic Director for both Loyola High School and Loyola College. In 1954 he was instrumental in bringing artificial ice to the Loyola College Stadium. In 1969 he was inaugurated into the Loyola College Hall of Fame. On January 28, 2000, the rink was named The Ed Meagher Arena.

On Saturday, February 1, 2014 a puckdrop ceremony marked the unveiling of the renovated Ed Meagher Arena. In May, 2013 the arena was modernized, thanks to a \$7.75 grant from the Government of Quebec and Concordia University. After 47 years the arena underwent significant renovations: a new rink that meets professional standards and an eco-friendly carbon dioxide (CO2) ice refrigeration system.

In September 1966, L. Ian MacDonald '66, editor of the "Loyola News", suggested that the new arena be named after Ed Meagher. Ed dedicated 55 years of his life to Loyola as a student, athlete, teacher, coach, athletic director, administrator, alumni director and friend. Ed died in 1995. At his funeral at St. Patrick's Basilica, 1500 mourners, both young and old, came to bid farewell to a legend.





### **HISTORY OF LOYOLA CRESTS**











Block LH





#### The All Activity Letter

The All-Activity Letter, a capital "L", is an honour bestowed on a Secondary Five student at graduation. It rewards the student who has participated in athletic and non-athletic extra-curricular activities. Activities are awarded points, accumulated over the five-year period a student is at Loyola.




In 1965 the criteria for the All Activity Letter required a minimum of 500 points. 200 came from athletics, where an athlete must have played at least one extra-mural sport. 150 points came from non-athletic activities. One bar was awarded for each 150 points over the 500 minimum. A student had to maintain a 65% average in 4th High and a 65% overall average.



In 1977 the criteria rose from 500 to 600 points, with 250 from athletic activities and 200 from non-athletic activities. The bar criteria remained the same. In 1980 the criteria was still 600 points, with 200 from athletics and 200 from non-athletic activities. The bar criteria was unchanged.







ent is a very solemn and reflective time for Christians around the world, and as members of the Loyola Family, it is hard for us to enter into this season without thinking of Father Eric Maclean, who passed away seven years ago on Ash Wednesday. I first met Fr. Maclean during the school's centennial celebrations in 1996 when he was the Provincial of the Society of Jesus. I remember holding a maypole and preparing to walk down the Windsor Hotel's famous Peacock Alley when Fr. Maclean showed up. Dressed in his finest priestly attire, he looked regal, distinguished, and had an aura of respectability about him when he spoke. Little did I know that this venerable man who shook my hand would eventually become my teacher, my fellow board member, and most importantly, my friend. Outside of his clerical attire, Fr. Maclean was not the most elegant dresser (it's hard for me not to picture him wearing his trademark worn out cardigan) but in all the years that I knew him, he never lost that aura of dignity to me.

Much has been said publicly about the man who dedicated thirty-three years of his life to Loyola. Fr. MacLean was known for his vision, his financial prowess, his deep sense of community, and of course, his fondness for parties. But I want to touch on one of the many personal memories that I have of the man who helped me prepare for public speaking competitions, who I shared good times with, and who showed up at my grandfather's wake and led an impromptu prayer service. He was always going above and beyond.

During my time at Loyola, I was involved in many of the school plays. One year, the play was a modern day version of Molière's "The Miser",

and attendance was more than disappointing. I was playing the role of a drunk, so I spent the majority of the play passed out on stage, which gave me a perfect view of the audience. Although it was discouraging to see a lot of empty chairs, every single night of the production Fr. Maclean was sitting in the front row. It was then that I became acquainted with his notoriety for nodding off, as I realized that I wasn't the only one who was passed out! Fr. Maclean's napping was the



stuff of legend; he was well known for his dozing off during school assemblies, meetings, liturgies, and even at Stratford! I never knew how much of our play Fr. Maclean actually saw, but his support meant the world to our cast and crew. He would congratulate us after each performance and made us feel that all the months we dedicated to the show were worth it in the end.

There are numerous Fr. Maclean stories out there, but the common denominator was how he expressed his great concern for others. He would show up to help the parents set up for the grad dance, by wheeling in his drink cart

and regaling them with stories. He would entertain The Mothers' Guild and casually remind them that they reaffirmed his vow of celibacy. He would scare the living daylights out of me when he would bellow out in his very distinguishable voice, "How's Matthew doing today?" But he always actually wanted to know. You don't always remember what a teacher says. but you never forget how they make you feel. In the case of Father Eric Maclean, you remembered both, as he worked to inspire you to live life as a true man for others for the Greater Glory of God.

### WHERE ARE THEY NOW?



estor's journey after Loyola eventually led him to McGill University in 1993. For the next four years he toiled in the department of Electrical Engineering, along with his fellow '91 Loyola classmates Steven DiGregorio and Micheal Venditti. In his last year, Nestor was required to write a thesis, and for those of you interested in such matters, it was named "Optimal Viterbi decoding and implementation for speed or area-constrained systems." He followed this up with Graduate courses in Data Communications, DSP, VLSI design, Image Processing and others. Over the next six years he achieved Bachelors in Environmental Studies and Architecture with semesters abroad in Rome and Helsinki and Co-op work terms in Ottawa, Boston, Helsinki and Montreal.

From 1999-2004, he started his career in Architecture with a small Manhattan


